

Accessing MAT

Prairie Ridge provides access to medication-assisted treatment for addiction to alcohol and opioids, such as heroin or prescription painkillers.

We offer Suboxone, Naltrexone, Vivitrol, Acamprosate, and Antabuse.

We are able to provide medical support for individuals in need of assistance with outpatient/ ambulatory detox.

Patients in need of medical detox are given a referral to our local hospital.

About Suboxone

Suboxone is the brand name for Buprenorphine, a medication approved by the FDA to treat Opioid Use Disorder.

When taken as prescribed, Suboxone is safe and effective.

- Diminishes the effects of physical dependency to opioids
- Increases safety in case of overdose
- Lowers the potential for misuse

About Naltrexone

Naltrexone is a medication approved by the FDA to treat both Opioid and Alcohol Use Disorders.


It is not an opioid, is not addictive, and does not cause withdrawal symptoms. Vivitrol is an extended-release injectable version of Naltrexone. Vivitrol and Naltrexone block receptors and reduce cravings.

About Antabuse

Antabuse is the brand name for Disulfiram, a medication approved by the FDA to treat Alcohol Use Disorder. Acts as a deterrent to drinking by producing significant physical reactions when taken in combination with alcohol.

About Acamprosate

Acamprosate is FDA-approved to treat Alcohol Use Disorder. It reduces the physical and emotional distress connected to cravings after alcohol use has ended.



What is MAT?

Medication-assisted treatment (MAT) is a combination of medications to treat addiction along with counseling and behavioral therapies. Our psychiatric practitioners will help you decide which combination of treatment is best for you.

MAT Effectiveness

- Lower risk of relapse
- Improve well-being
- Increase ability to gain and maintain employment
- Improve birth outcomes among women who have substance use disorders and are pregnant
- Decrease risk of getting HIV or Hepatitis C
